Background (CPPP)

- Community Program Planning Process (CPPP) means the process to be used by the County to develop the MHSA Three-Year Program and Expenditure Plans, and the MHSA Annual Updates in partnership with stakeholders to:
- Identify community issues related to mental illness resulting from lack of community services and supports, including any issues identified during the implementation of the MHSA.
- 2. Identifying the behavioral health needs in the community
- Identify and re-evaluate priorities and strategies to meet those mental health needs.



Sacramento County MHSA Plan Development-Community Program Planning Process

Approving

Board of Supervisors (BOS)

- Approves MHSA Three Year Plan and **Annual Updates**
- Grants revenue, appropriation, & contracting authority

Recommending

Mental Health Board (MHB)

- Provides collective comment during posting period
- · Conducts public hearing at close of posting period
- Provides recommendations to BOS as part of their mandate

Recommending

Division of Behavioral Health Services (BHS)

- Develops proposed work plans/programs based upon recommendations, public feedback, & DHCS guidelines
- Reviews documents with BHS Director.
- Upon BHS Director's approval, posts draft documents for public review and comment

Recommending

MHSA Steering Committee

- HUB for BHS MHSA CPPP
- Provides guidelines to workgroups and reviews proposals
- •Submits program recommendations to Division for plan development
- Provides collective comment during posting period

Recommending

Bodies that may develop program proposals and make recommendations to BHS, including but not limited to:

- Alcohol and Drug Advisory Board Family Advocate Committee
- Behavioral Health Racial Equity Collaborative
- Mental Health Board
- Older Adult Coalition
- Cultural Competence Committee Peer Adult Advocacy Committee

Innovative Project

An Innovative Project is a project that a county designs and implements for a defined time period and evaluates to develop a new best practices in mental health services and supports.

 5% of local MHSA funding shall be used for Innovative Programs



Innovative Project Requirements

The Innovative Programs are required to have the following purposes:

- 1. To increase access to underserved groups.
- 2. To increase the quality of services, including better outcomes.
- 3. To promote interagency collaboration.
- 4. To increase access to services, including, but not limited to, services provided through permanent supportive housing.



^{*}All projects must select one of the above as its primary purpose.

All Innovative projects must support innovative approaches by doing one of the following:

- Introduce a new mental health practices or approaches, including but, not limited to, prevention and early intervention.
- Making a change to an existing practice or approach, including, but not limited to adaptation for a new setting or community.
- Introducing a new application to the mental health system of a promising community-driven practice or an approach that has been successful in non-mental health contexts or settings.
- Participating in a housing program designed to stabilize a person's living situation while also providing supportive services on site.

- Administrative, governance, and organizational practices, processes, or procedures
- Advocacy (i.e. client and/or family advocacy)
- Education and training for service providers, including nontraditional mental health practitioners
- Outreach, capacity building, and community development.
- System development
- Public education efforts
- Research
- Services and interventions, including prevention, early intervention, and treatment
- Permanent supportive housing development



- If an innovative project has proven to be successful and the community/county chooses to continue it, the project work plan is required to transition to another category of funding as appropriate.
- Innovative programs are required to receive approval from the Mental Health Services Oversight and Accountability Commission prior to expending funds.

INN Projects must align with the MHSA General Standards:

- Community Collaboration
- Cultural Competence
- Client Driven
- Family Driven
- Wellness, Recovery and Resilience Focus
- Integrated Service Experience

INN Project Recap

- Time-limited; not more than 5 years
- Time frame is based on complexity of the approach and evaluation of the approach
- If successful, County may continue the project but must transition it to another funding category
- Requires BOS, MHSOAC approval
- Must align with the MHSA General Standards
