	 May is Older Americans Month (OAM). OAM focuses on recognizing the contributions of older Americans', highlighting aging trends and reaffirming the commitment to serving the older adults in our communities. The 2024 theme is <i>Powered by Connection</i> and recognizes the impact meaningful relationships and social connections have on our health and well-being. To learn more about OAM, visit <u>Administration for Community Living</u>. The Department of Child, Family and Adult Services (DCFAS) Senior and Adult Services Division (SAS) will be recognizing older Americans at the Board of Supervisors (BOS) meeting on Tuesday, May 24, 2024. In addition, SAS will be honoring five (5) older volunteers who have a combined total of 111 years of volunteering. Lori Miller, SC Member: Sacramento County Substance Use Prevention and Treatment Services (SUPT) announced more than 392 people lost their lives to fentanyl poisoning in Sacramento County in 2023. In 2024, 74 lives were lost to fentanyl poisoning, a decline in overdose and deaths due to prevention efforts. Safer Sacramento launched an eight-part fentanyl blog series. Parts 1 and 2 of the series are live and can be viewed at SaferSacramento.com. SUPT is planning the 2024 Fentanyl Summit that will take place at CSU Sacramento. The summit is August 15, 2024, and registration will open May 27, 2024. May 7, 2024, is National Fentanyl Awareness Day. This day honors those lost to fentanyl poisonings through increasing public awareness and education. May is National Treatment Court Month. SUPT acknowledges and thanks all of our partnerships in Sacramento County. SUPT has over ten collaborative treatment court programs and Behavioral Health Services (BHS) works with a lot of justice partners serving individuals who struggle with both substance use and mental health issues along with being involved in the justice system. We want to recognize the teams doing the hard work in our communi

	What are the SC seats being filled?
	Current roles include:
	1. One (1) SC Co-Chair
	2. Two (2) Executive Committee Members
	3. Four (4) Selection Subcommittee Members
	If someone terms out of a seat during the current election cycle, are they able to volunteer for a different position on the SC? For example, if someone terms out of their role on the executive committee are they able to volunteer on the selection subcommittee?
	Yes, a member may volunteer for a different seat when they term out of their current role on the SC.
	What is the time commitment for the available roles?
	Time commitment may vary throughout the year.
	However, in general:
	• Steering Committee Members spend approximately three hours a month on SC duties. This includes the monthly two-hour SC meeting and one (1) hour to review meeting materials.
	• Executive Committee Members spend approximately four hours a month on SC duties. This includes the monthly two-hour SC meeting, the monthly one-hour Executive meeting and one hour to review meeting materials.
	Selection Subcommittee Members spend approximately four hours a month on SC and Selection Committee duties combined. It is important to note that some months there will be no applications to review.
	How does the nomination process work?
	MHSA SC Members will have the opportunity to put forth nominations via an online survey. After the survey concludes, MHSA
	staff will confirm nomination acceptance from nominees. A second survey will be sent out to all Steering Committee members to vote on confirmed nominees.
