II. Agenda Review	The agenda was reviewed. No changes were made.		
III. Review of Prior Meeting Minutes	The February 2025 draft meeting minutes were reviewed. No changes were made.		
IV. Announcements	Melissa Jacobs, SC Member: Sacramento County Senior and Adult Services (SAS) presented their Local Age and Disability-Friendly Action Plan (LADAP) to the Board of Supervisors (BOS) on Tuesday, February 25, 2025, and the BOS approved the LADAP. Marylyn Sepulveda, SC Member: Powell's Landing and Hope Landing are permanent supportive housing (PSH) projects that are opening and accepting new residents. Hope Landing, the complex providing housing to formerly homeless adults 55 and over, has received clearance to occupy. Residents can begin moving in the week of March 24, 2025. The second property, Powell's Landing, is expected to begin accepting residents either at the end of March 2025 or the beginning of April 2025. Staff and community partners are encouraged to check the status of individuals on the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) list and ensure all required documents are submitted for eligibility. This will facilitate placement into one of the nearly 200 new PSH units coming online with these projects.

V. Executive Committee / MHSA Updates	Executive Committee Updates: None MHSA Updates:		
	 Ryan Quist, Behavioral Health Director and SC Member: CARE Court went live on December 1, 2024, in Sacramento County. CARE Court is a new program available to individuals aged 18 and older who are diagnosed with a schizophrenia spectrum or other psychotic disorder, currently experiencing behaviors and symptoms associated with severe mental illness (SMI), unable to stabilize through existing voluntary treatment, and unlikely to survive safely in the community without supervision. A petition must be filed with the Sacramento Superior Court to enroll into this program. Individuals who are qualified to file a petition include family members, first responders, and behavioral health providers. The Sacramento Superior Court provides legal

	technical assistance for individuals wanting to file a petition through their self-help center. Sacramento County BHS also has a team available to provide support.
	 California Senate Bill (SB) 43 went into effect January 1, 2025. SB 43 expanded the definition of "grave disability" to include those individuals who are unable to care for their basic needs for health and safety due to a severe substance use disorder, or a co-occurring mental health disorder, and a severe substance use disorder. SB 43 also expands the definition of "basic needs" to include a person's ability to obtain necessary medical care, personal safety, food, weather appropriate clothing, and/or shelter.
	 Proposition 36, a voter initiative, went live in December 2024. Prop 36 increases felony charges and sentences for certain drug and theft crimes, while creating a new treatment-focused court process for some drug possession crimes. Since implementation, there has been an influx of misdemeanor cases; no felony cases have been reported thus far. Efforts are still ramping up, and there is ongoing collaboration with partners in the courts regarding the implementation of this initiative.

	Reminder for all Steering Committee members that with your support, MHSA has invested some of our MHSA housing dollars to secure dedicated units for behavioral health at both Powell's Landing and Hope Landing. Each property will have 30 dedicated units, marking an important partnership with HOPE Cooperative to expand the portfolio of PSH units. El Hogar will be providing services at both sites. This achievement is something to celebrate, and more details about this work can be found in the Draft MHSA FY 2025-2026 Annual Update. It will also be highlighted in tonight's presentation.
