Program Details:

The Sacramento County Division of Behavioral Health Services (BHS), through Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) component funding and in collaboration with California Mental Health Services Authority (CalMHSA) implemented a second round of the Time-Limited Community-Driven Grant Program. Round II awarded \$10 million in grants to 27 local community-based organizations with awards up to \$425,000.

Program Objective:

The Sacramento County Time-Limited Community-Driven PEI Grant Program is intended to build community capacity by addressing the mental health needs of communities by promoting mental health and wellness, increasing mental health services, and reducing stigma associated with mental health and wellness through cultural and linguistic congruent programs and activities that serve diverse communities.
