

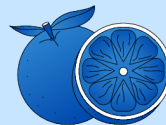


What to Know About California Senate Bill 43

About California Senate Bill (SB) 43

SB 43 expands the adult definition of “grave disability” to include those individuals who are unable to care for their basic needs for health and safety due to a severe substance use disorder, or a co-occurring mental health disorder and a severe substance use disorder.

SB 43 also expands the definition of “basic needs” to include a person’s ability to obtain necessary medical care, personal safety, food, clothing, and/or shelter.



Important Implications

Involuntary Psychiatric Treatment

SB 43 allows an individual to be placed on an involuntary psychiatric hold for grave disability due to severe substance use disorder, or a co-occurring mental health disorder and a severe substance use disorder.

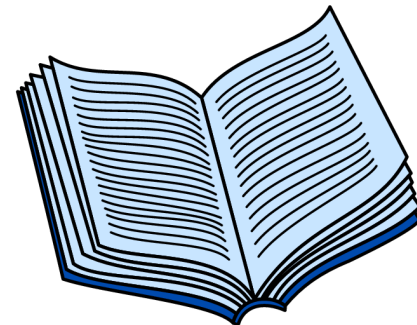
