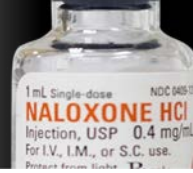

# Naloxone by County



## Siskiyou

At intake, the nurse determines if client is an opioid user. Once that is determined, naloxone is placed in the patient's property.

## Marin

A naloxone training class is provided on all housing units, open to all patients, every two weeks. Once patients have attended the class, they sign a form if they are interested in having naloxone placed in their property. Naloxone then placed in property by custody.

## Contra Costa

Training is offered to all patients and provided by CHS nurses. After the training, patients fill out a card stating they would like naloxone, and custody places it in their property.

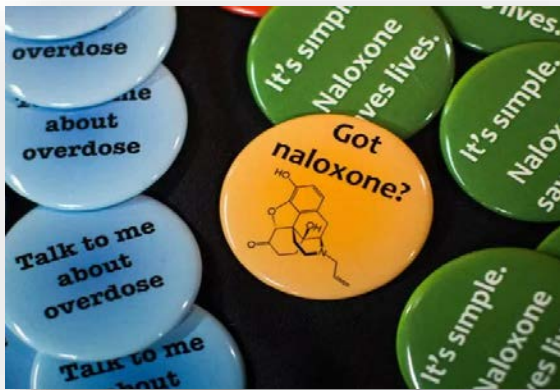
## Alameda

Case manager, perinatal coordinator, and discharge planner offer naloxone to appropriate patients and provide training to those who accept (80% accept). Then send referral to MD to write Rx, pharmacy fills and its held till release, nurse gives to patient and obtains patient signature at release.



## Plumas

All patients are offered naloxone training during their last week in custody. They have had no refusals. Once training is completed, custody is notified and places naloxone kits in patient's property.



## San Luis Obispo

Patients are recruited from jail AA/NA programs and then screened for opioid use. They are provided training facilitated by Sheriff's Office. Once completed, medical staff are notified, and place naloxone in the patient's property.
