FIGURE 1: Percent of Respondents Who Report Experiencing Benefits of the Accreditation Process

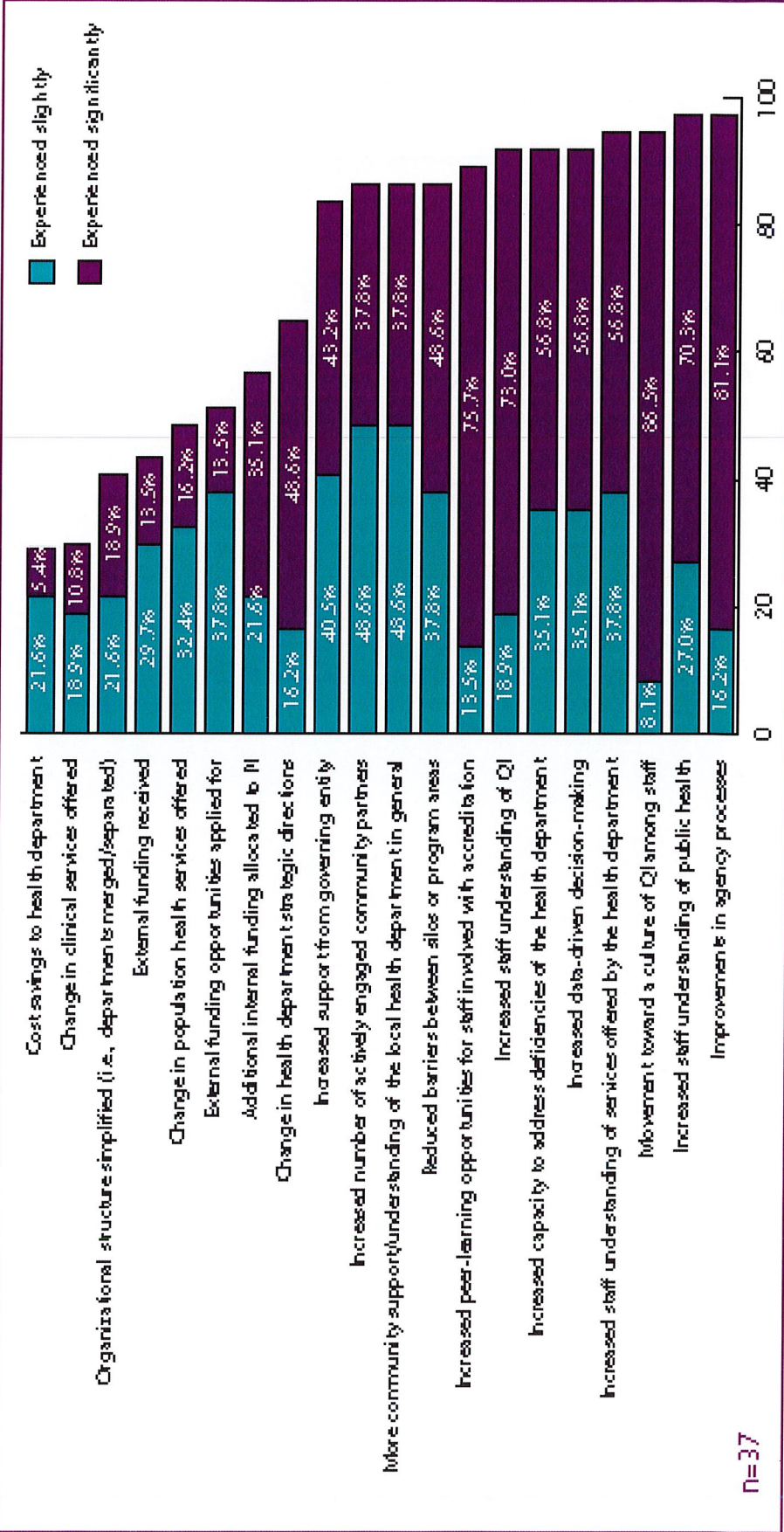


FIGURE 5: Process Benefits: Organizational Structure and Capabilities

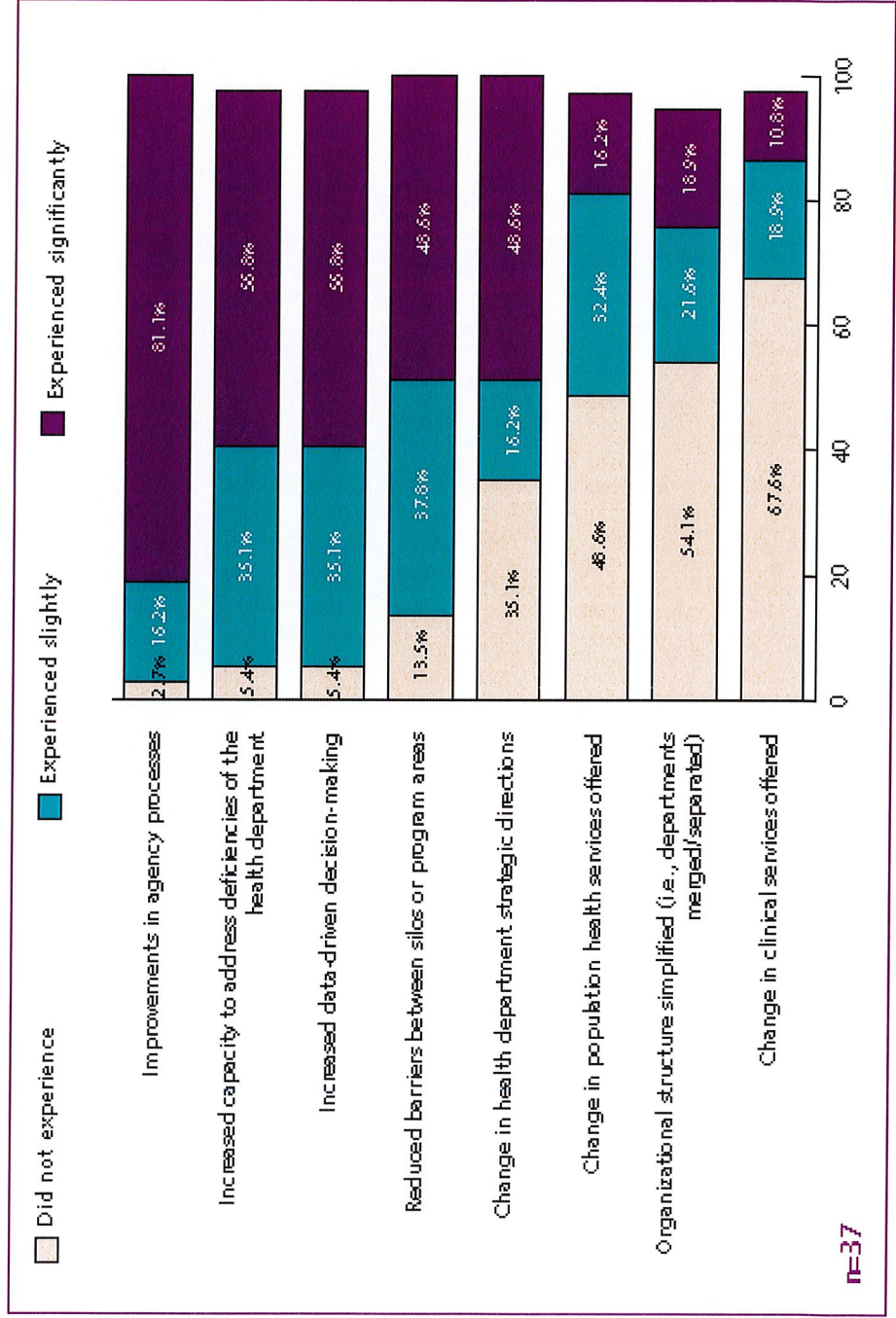
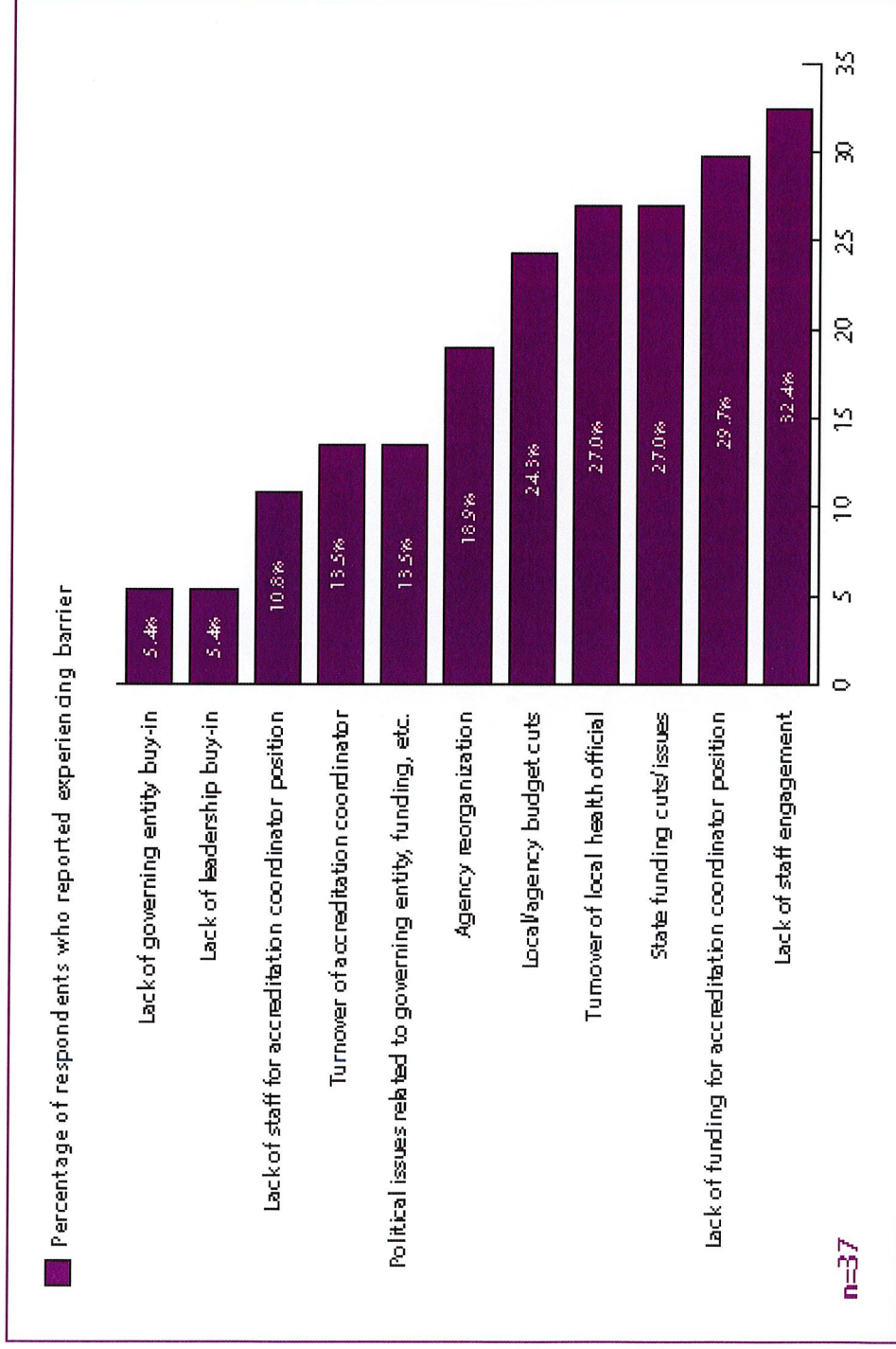


FIGURE 7: Barriers to the Accreditation Process



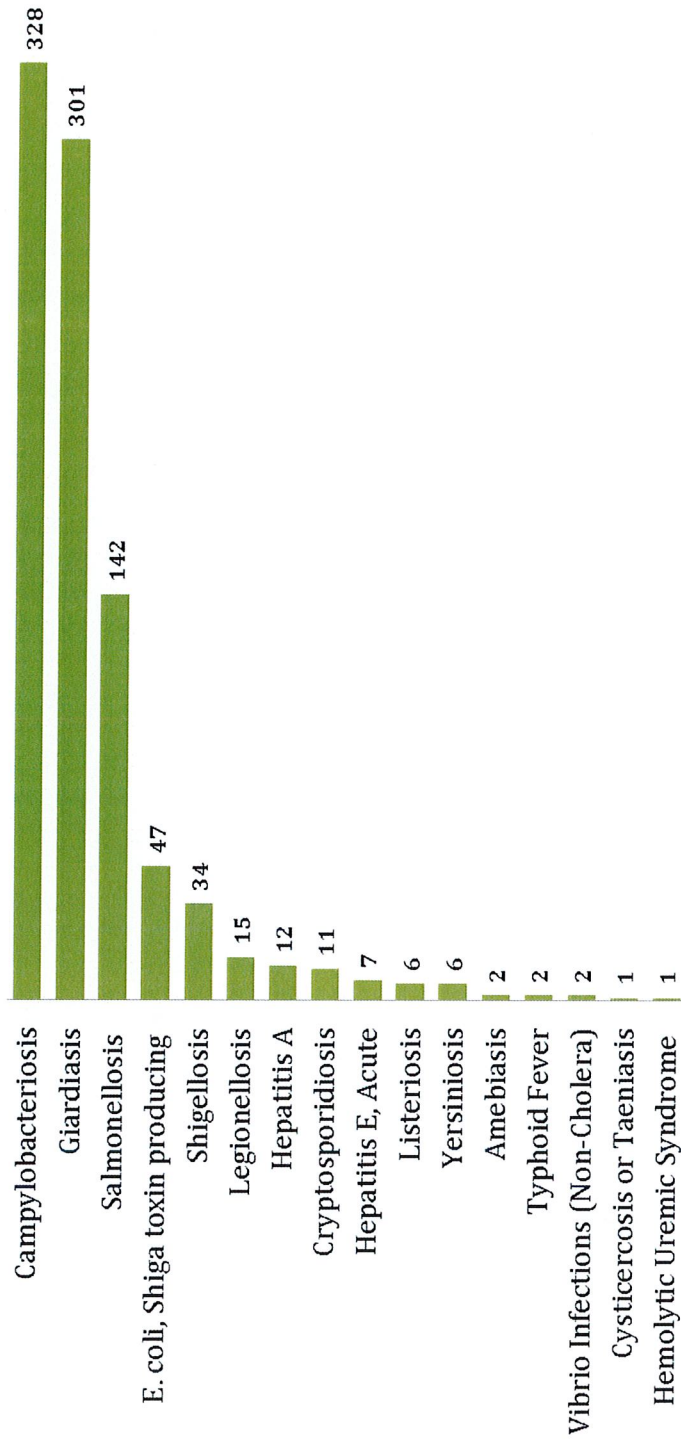

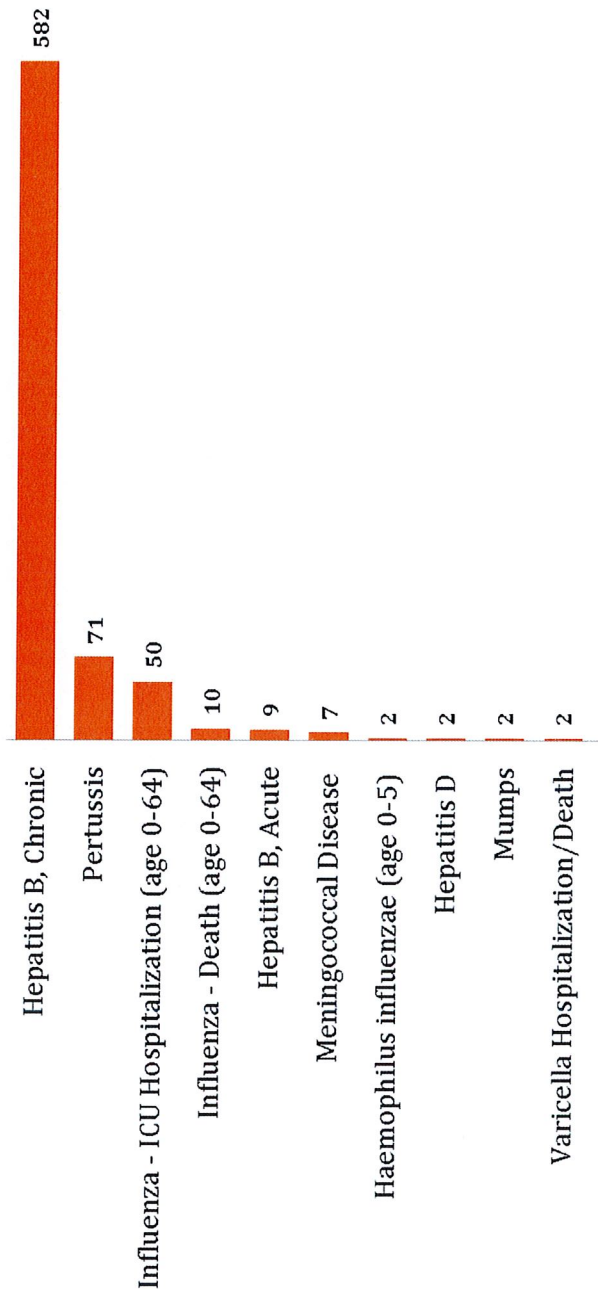

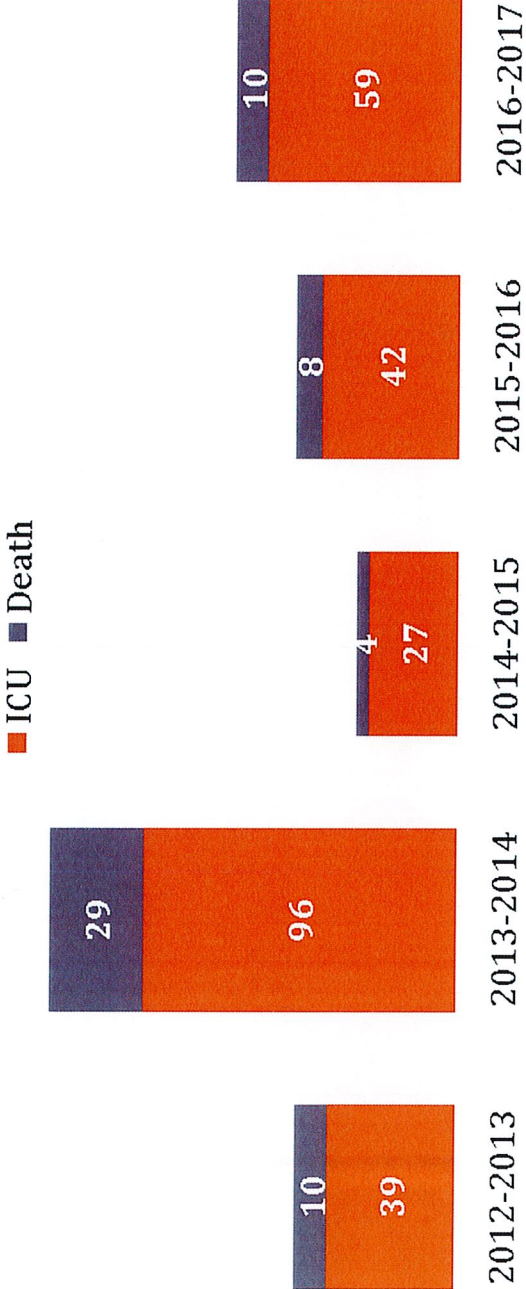
Foodborne/Waterborne Disease Cases, 2016



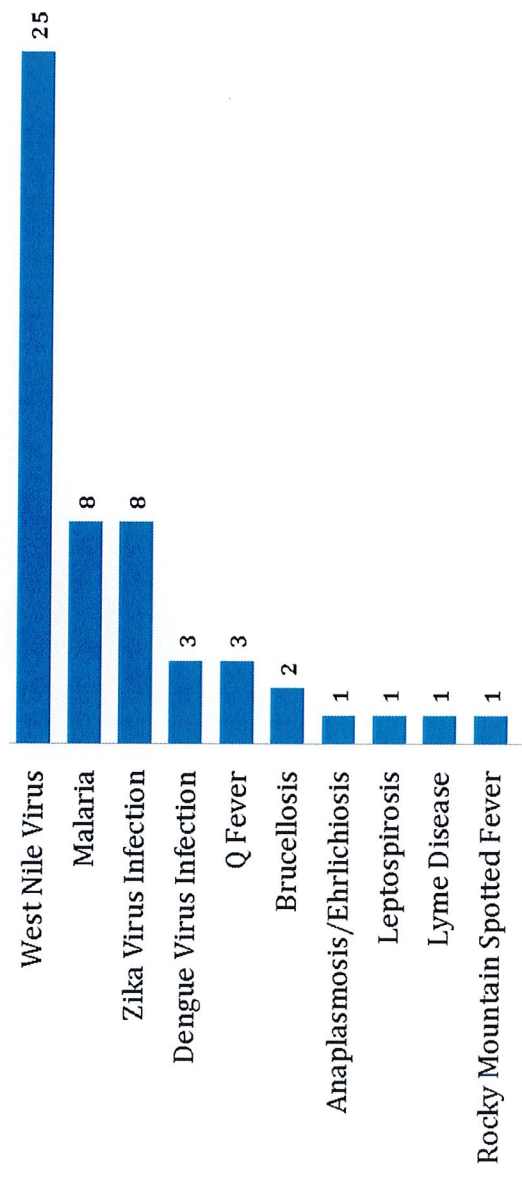
Vaccine-Preventable Disease Cases, 2016



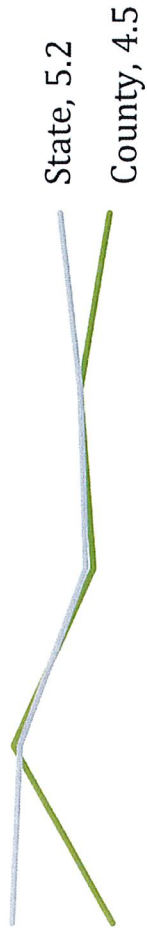
Influenza ICU Hospitalizations and Deaths (Age <65)

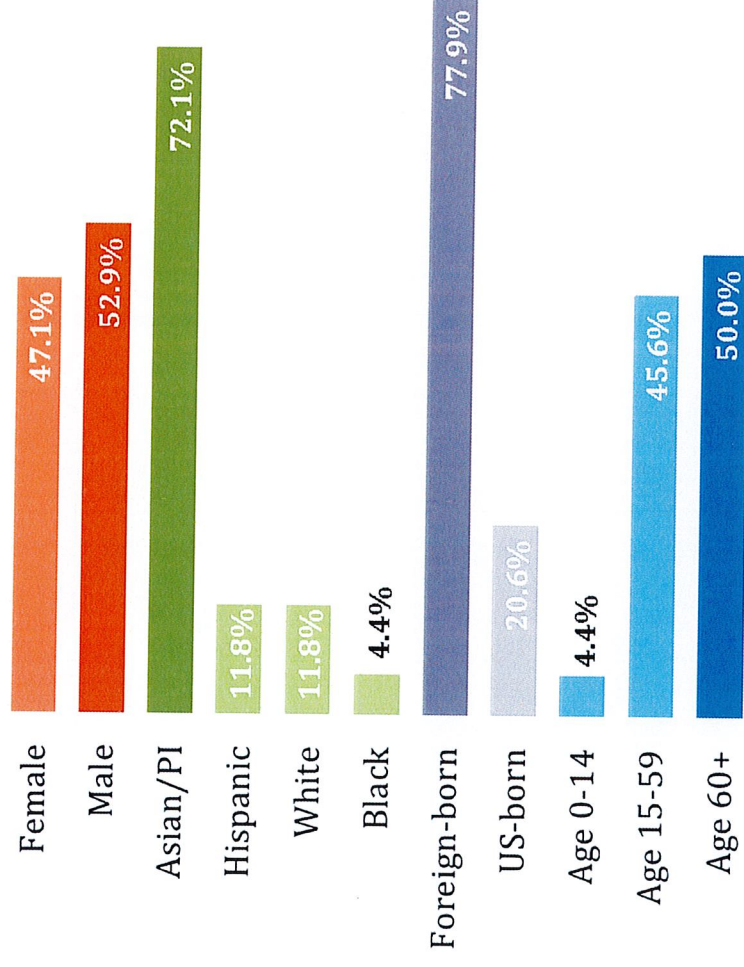

Demographic Characteristics of Tuberculosis Cases, 2016

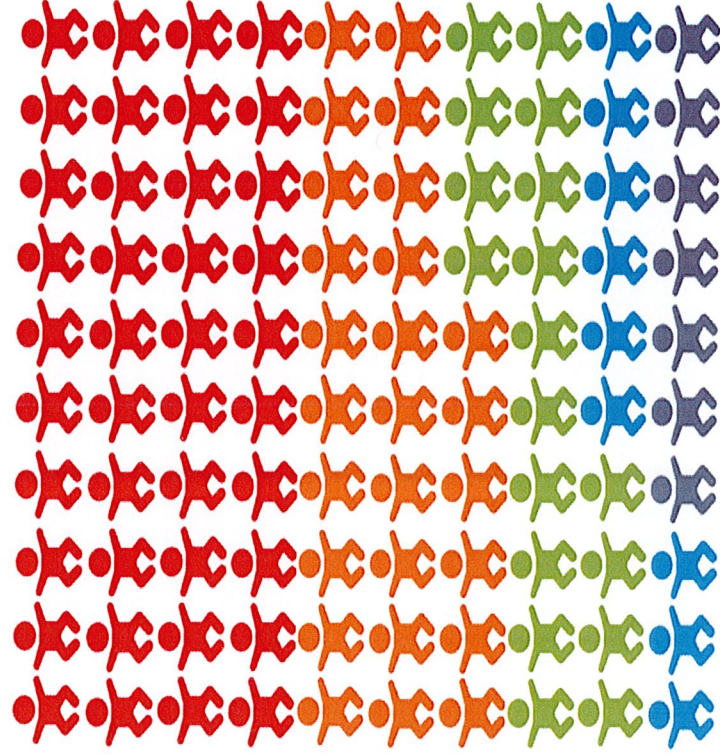
- The highest percentages of TB cases occurred among males, Asian/Pacific Islanders, Foreign-born persons, and those age 60+

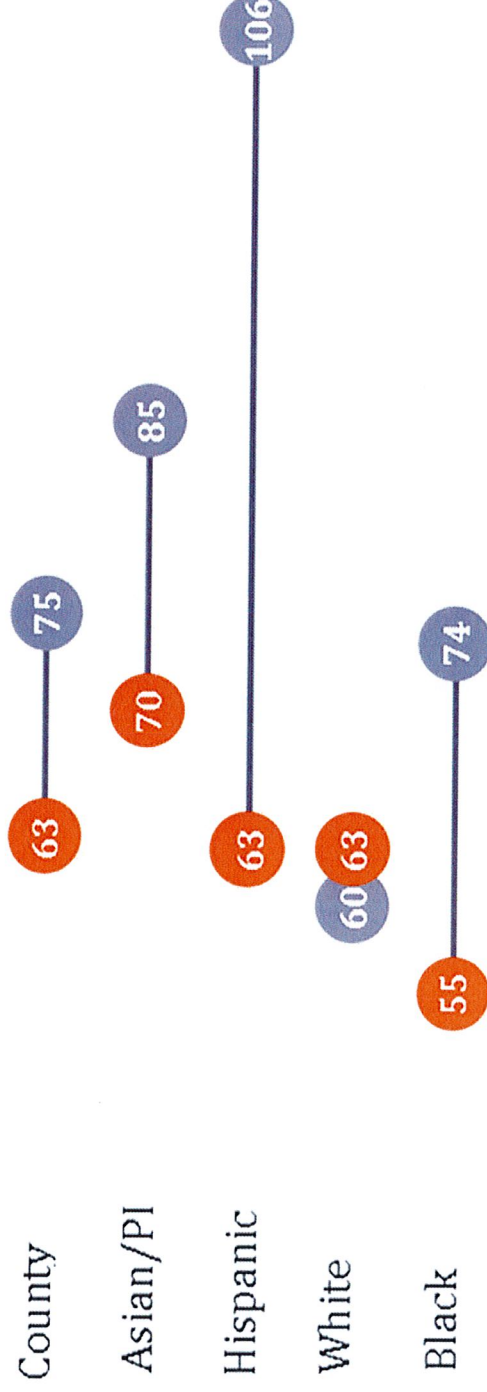
Number of Births by Maternal Race/Ethnicity in 2016



- **Total:** 19,592
- **White:** 7,920 (40.4%)
- **Hispanic:** 5,091 (26.0%)
- **Asian/PI:** 3,599 (18.4%)
- **Black:** 1,826 (9.3%)
- **Other:** 1,156 (%)
 - Multi-race: 1,093 (5.6%)
 - AI/AN: 63 (0.3%)

- About 2/5 of all births were to White mothers and about 1/4 of all births were to Hispanic mothers in 2016.

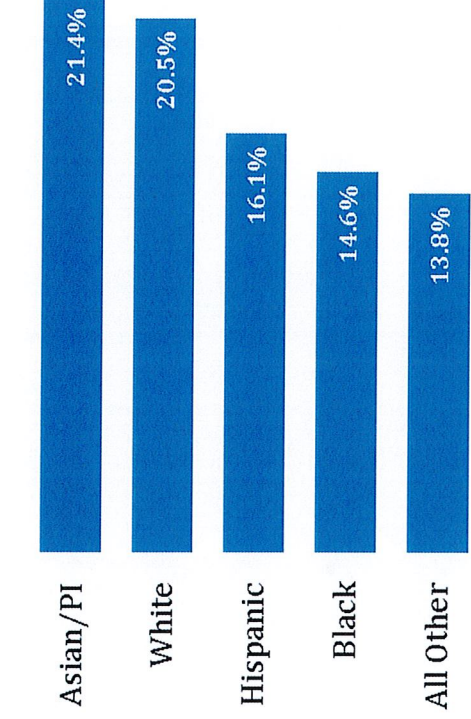
Fertility Rates by Select Race/Ethnicity, 2007 and 2016



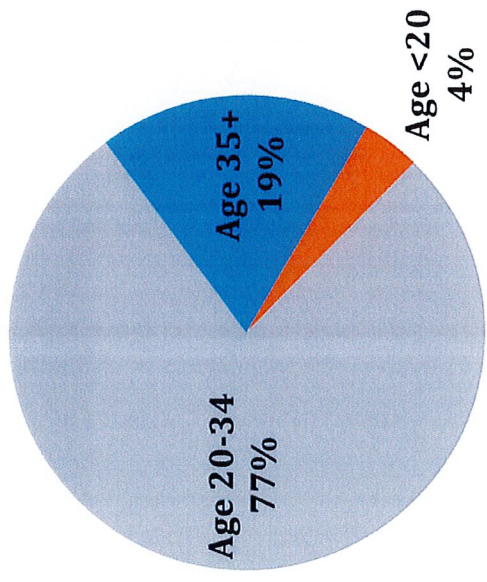
- Fertility rates decreased for all racial/ethnic groups except for Whites
- Asian/Pacific Islanders had the highest fertility rates in 2016 whereas Hispanics had the highest fertility rates in 2007

Advanced maternal age by race/ ethnicity

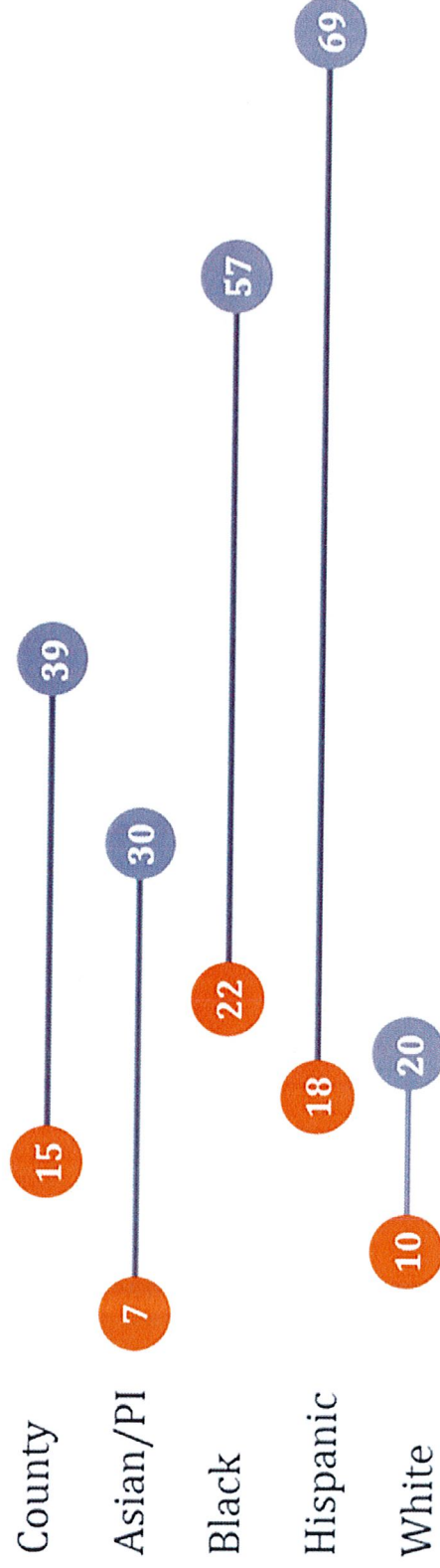


Births by Maternal Age Group



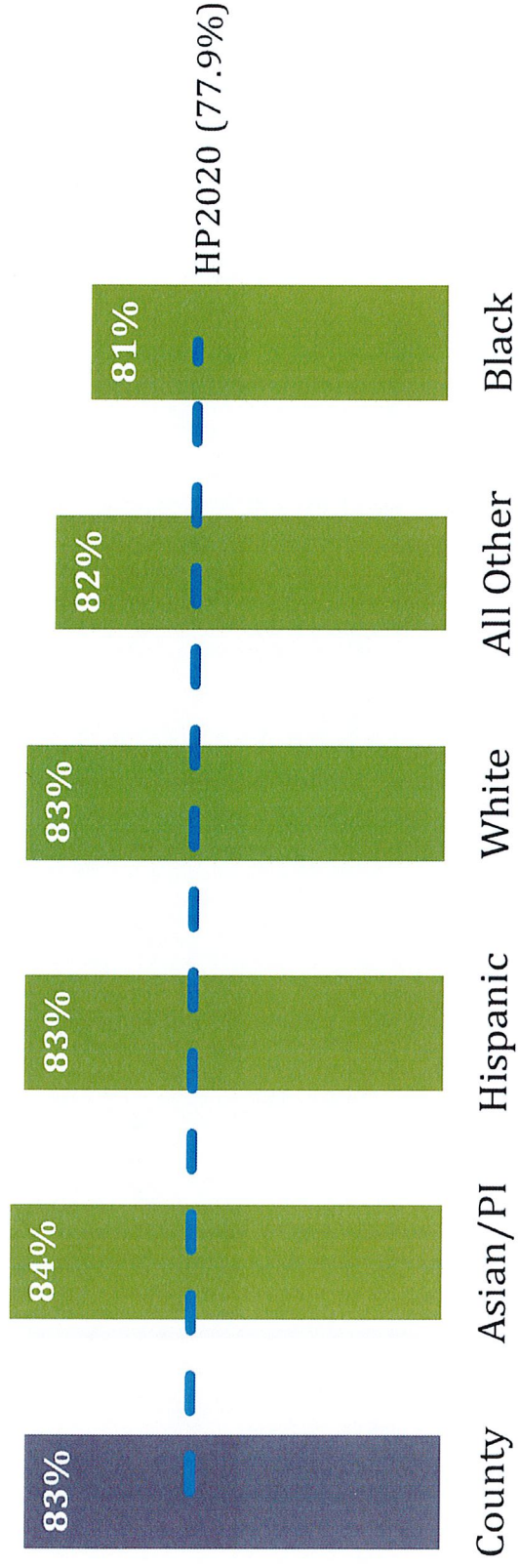
- The majority of births were to women ages 20-34, but about 1/5 of births were to women of advanced maternal age.
- Asian/Pacific Islander and White women were the most likely to give birth at age 35 or older.

Teen Birth Rates by Select Maternal Race/Ethnicity 2007 and 2016



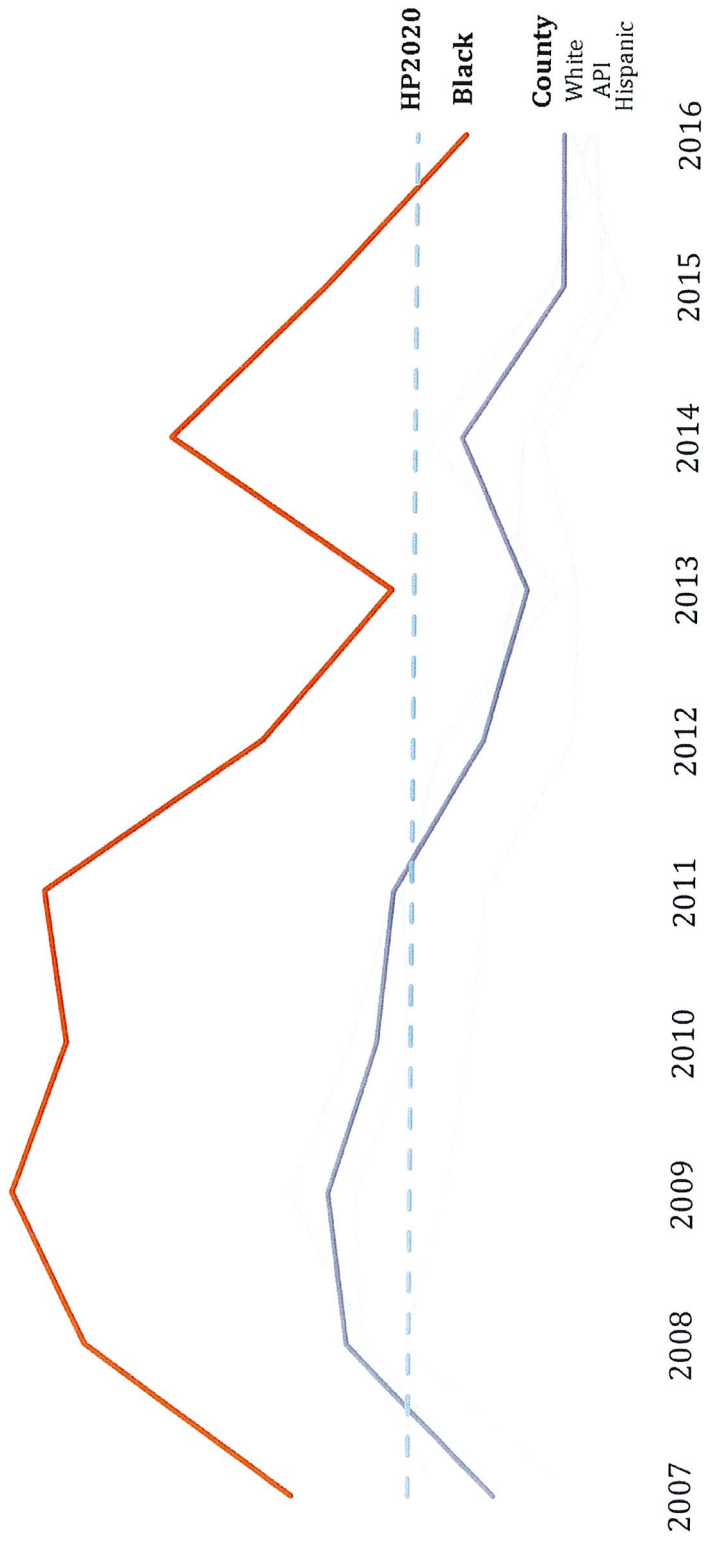
- Teen birth rates have decreased for all racial/ethnic groups

First Trimester Prenatal Care by Maternal Race/Ethnicity, 2016

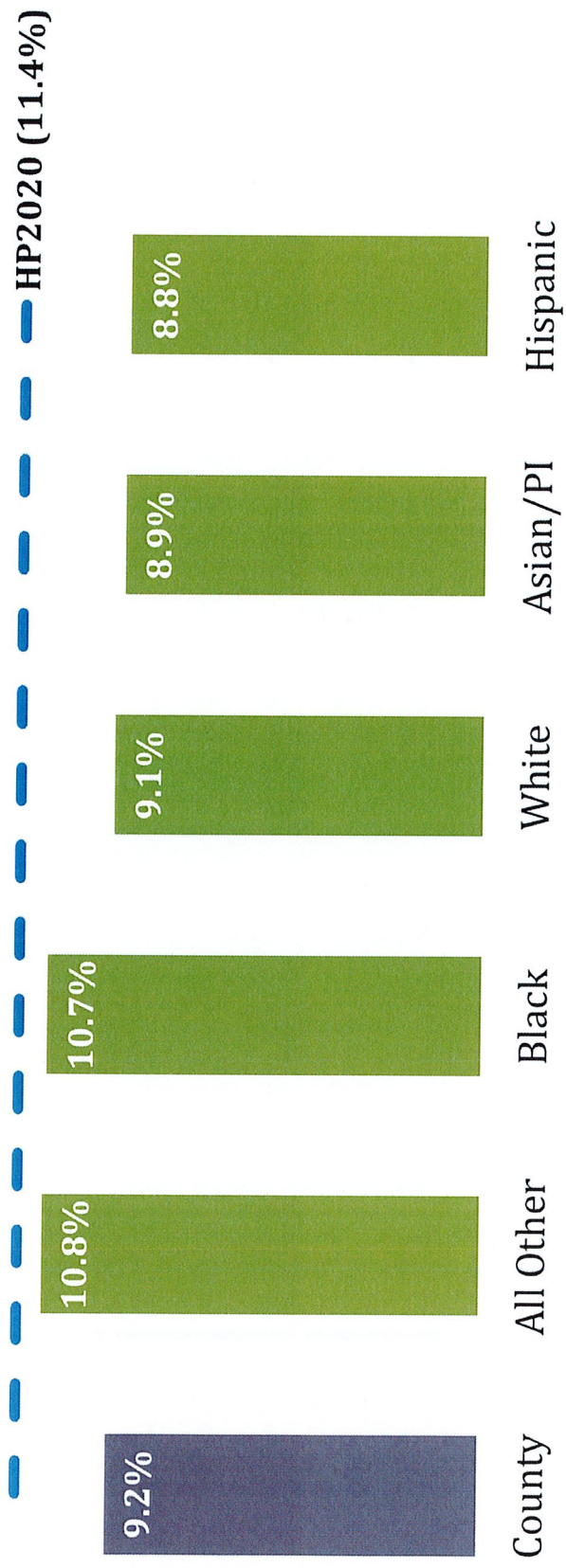


- The County and all racial/ethnic groups met the HP2020 Objective for early prenatal care

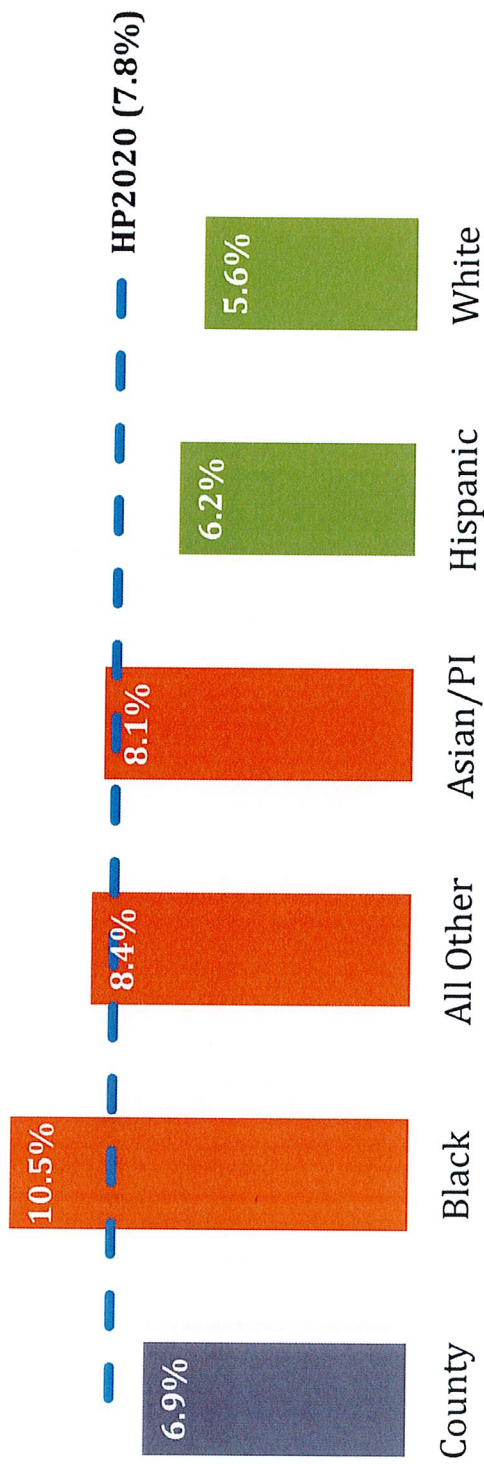

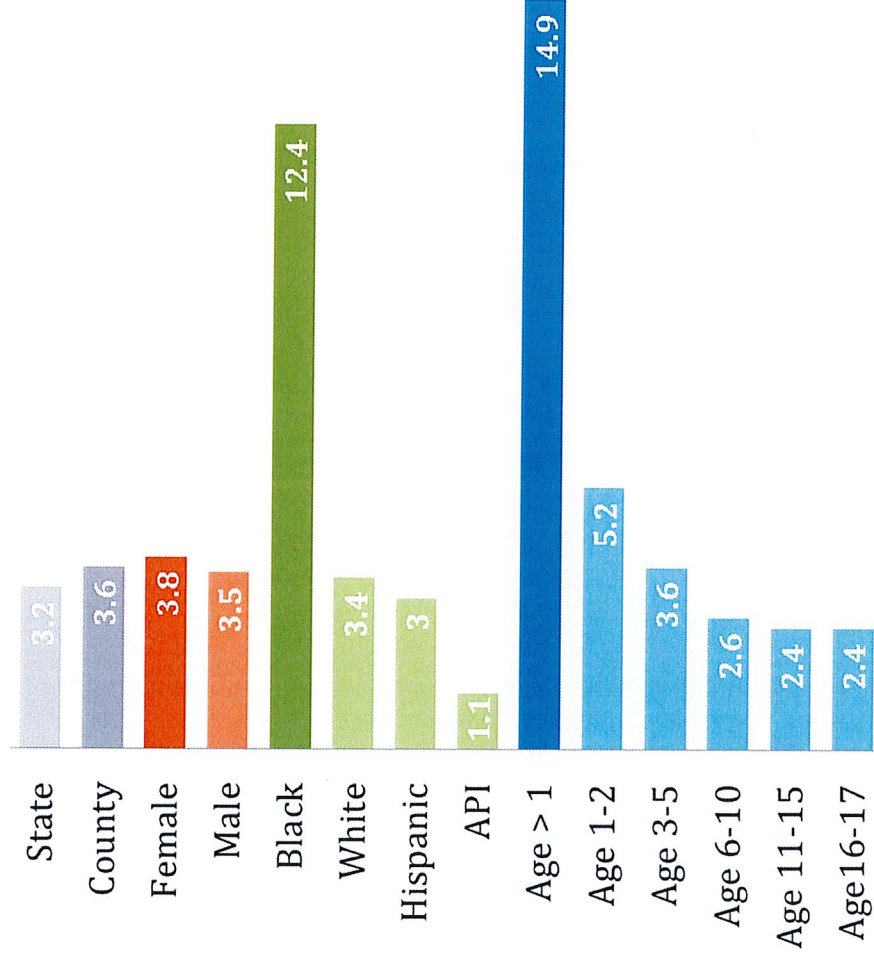


Low Birth Weight



Foster Care Entry Rates, 2016

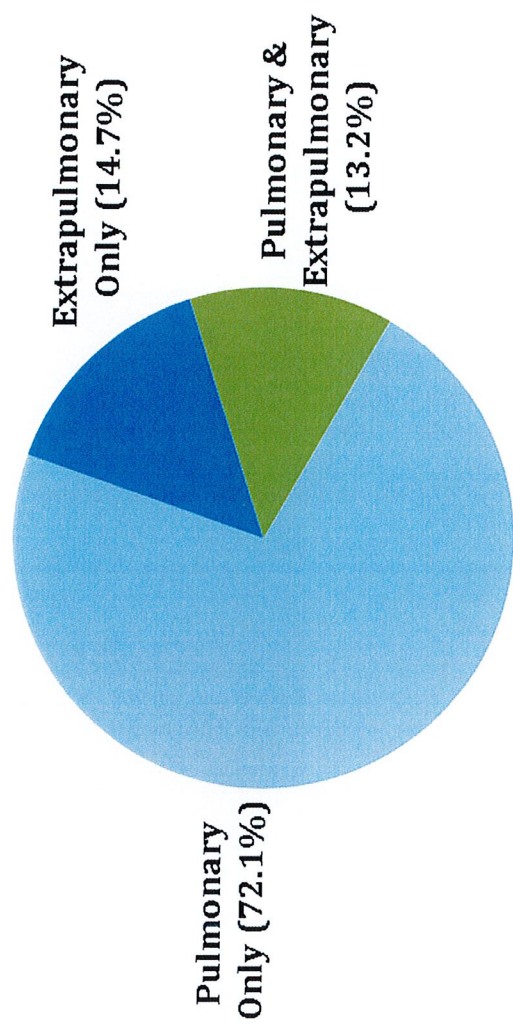
- County rates of entry were higher than the State

Physical Abuse	2,148	7.2%
Sexual Abuse	538	1.8%
Voluntary Re-entry	326	1.1%
Other	1,352	4.5%
