#### ADULT CORRECTIONAL HEALTH

• Links were sent via email for staff reports on 10/22 Item #66 Report on Efforts to Reduce the Jail Population and Item #67 RCCC Improvement Project. Item #66 outlines various county initiatives to reduce the jail population.

- Item #67 RCCC had a follow-up yesterday. See 11/05/19 Item #49. This was not approved. The "health" components included new buildings for Medical Clinic/Medical Housing/Pharmacy and a new intake unit for bookings. The construction did not increase rated bed capacity. It was meant to replace areas that were not designed for health/mental health care and are not conducive to treatment. They also lack ADA/HIPAA requirements. Unsure how we will proceed at this point.

#### CALIFORNIA ADVANCING AND INNOVATING MEDI-CAL (CaIAIM)

- State DHCS published a proposal that includes sweeping, dramatic changes in the Medi-Cal program. This proposal, a managed care procurement, and a heightened focus on quality measures (incentives/sanctions) mark significant changes. This is a phased in plan.

#### **PRESENTATION**

Bob Erlenbusch, Executive Director Sacramento Regional Coalition to End Homelessness **Death in Homeless Population** 

#### **Program Overview**

Sacramento Regional Coalition to End Homelessness is a great resource to end homelessness. No direct services are provided, it is an advocacy organization focusing on public policy, affordable housing, addressing civil rights and healthcare issues, etc.

#### The Data

The data presented today is about a year behind due the way in which it is rolled out from the coroner's office. It takes them about six or seven months to review causes of death, etc. Since 2017, the number of homeless has increased from 3,500 to almost 6,000. The homeless death rate has increased from 124 (2017) to 132 (2018). These numbers include adults and children. Overwhelmingly, these deaths occur in the homeless male population more often than female;

roughly around seventy five percent are male. These findings are not necessarily unique to Sacramento, almost all studies (few exceptions) have the same pattern; gender, age group, manner of death, etc.

## Homeless Life Expectancy (cut short)

The average age of homeless men is just under 52 years old compared to women, which is about 43 years of age. Though death in males occur more often, homeless women die younger. Using the national life expectancy average of 75 years, homeless lives in Sacramento are cut short by an average of 33% or about 32 years for homeless women and 23 years for homeless men. 1 in 6 die by homicide or suicide.

### **Policy Recommendations**

- Expand the sources of funding for the Sacramento City & County Affordable Housing Trust fund to create more affordable & accessible housing
- Support for "housing first" approach, but where housing is lacking, increase the capacity of the crisis response
  system for <u>year round</u> shelter, especially for homeless youth and women to serve more homeless people through a
  no barrier Triage Center; year round emergency shelter; 1<sup>st</sup> Steps Communities

- Increase funding for alcohol & other drugs and mental health treatment programs. Increase effective linkage to Medi-Cal existing services. Refund Volunteers of America (VOA's) free treatment on demand program
- Sacramento City Council and Sacramento Board of Supervisors adopt a "Zero Tolerance Policy" regarding Homeless "Patient Dumping"
- Expand funding for Respite Care Facilities
- Increase funding resources to support additional licensed nurse outreach services, with a priority of out-stationing nurses at winter shelter sites as well as adding nurses to street outreach teams
- Ensure full enrollment of homeless people on CalFresh & full implementation of Restaurant Meals Program
- Free or subsidized transportation for homeless people
- Sacramento County's Coroner Office convene a Homeless Deaths Review Committee, similar to death review panels for children and victims of domestic violence

#### **Advocacy Success**

- 2018: City and County declare "shelter emergency"
- 2016: Mayor Steinberg announced using city buildings as warming centers
- 2014: Sacramento County Board of Supervisors: allocated \$260,000 in FY 2014-15 budget to increase RN street
  outreach to homeless people; Sacramento Steps Forward: Street outreach/system navigators focused on geographic
  areas of high mortality rates; Public Education: Community presentations & media coverage
  - 6 Annual Interfaith Homeless Memorial Service: 12/20/2019, 7 pm 8 pm Trinity Cathedral

#### **Advocacy Next Steps**

- Expand the Sacramento City & County Affordable Housing Trust Fund;
- Year Round Shelter
- Weekend Drop In Center
- Drug & Mental Health Treatment on Demand
- Ensure <u>access</u> to preventative health care
