Meeting Format Discussion and Recommendations

What would it take to make meetings more participatory?

Feedback from pre-survey

- I think people would be more engaged if there was a clearer vision on how information would be used and how they should be engaging in it. Right now it feels like we consume a lot of information but aren't really engaging or using it in any way (except for once or twice a year when we write a letter - and even then, most people aren't involved in interpreting the information or applying it to recommendations in a letter. A lot of that happens behind the scenes). I think one way we could make people more involved is if we had meetings that were devoted predominately to discussion, rather than just passive attendance at a presentation.
- Hold open discussion sessions, pose open ended questions
- Connecting PHAB meeting topics and presentations with the recommended focal points for the Board. Maybe ending meetings with a survey on if we feel more informed on a topic or what was gained from the presentation.
- For me personally, I would love to see the meetings outside of work hours as I would just have more capacity to engage and participate. I understand this is probably not possible, so I think finding ways in which we can allow more time for open-ended conversations (i.e., perhaps we don't have a full agenda for each meeting, but instead have a space to just discuss issues that are important to us, updates outside of the agenda, etc).

What feedback do you have on the PHAB Meeting Format? (e.g. updates from County staff, typically followed by presentation and Q&A)

Feedback from pre-survey

- It feels like we are trying to cram too much into a meeting. Could we consider alternating every other month, where in Month A we have an external presentation (with clear prompts/objectives developed ahead of time) followed by Q&A; in Month B we do the round of County updates (in a less rushed format and again with more time for Q&A) followed by a debrief of the previous month's presentation and a discussion on whether and how we want to take it forward as PHAB. Then back to Month A format.
- I like the format we have currently. I am curious if we should add a public comment section?
- It is great, the updates from county and presentations are very informative
- I really appreciate that each meeting starts with sac county public health status updates. The presentations are always informative and presented well. I wouldn't change the format but, it would be nice to know if these groups or presenters have an ask for PHAB.

 - Streamline County updates. Circulate information/update prior to the meeting. Primary Health started doing that. Ask PHAB to submit questions in advance.

Meeting Format Discussion in Small Groups

Group 1 Discussion & Recommendations

- Share materials in advance pre-read
- Articulate meeting objectives and decision points for meeting at beginning of meeting with review of them at the end
- Focus/attention to priority areas each meeting
- Engage expert area speakers
- Discussion point: cross-match PHAB priorities with sub committees and prioritize for reporting
- Strengthen PHAB relationship to Board of Supervisors
 - Unclear if there is a POC from Board of supervisors or a representative

- Board membership include community member of priority area such as in recovery or suicide survivor
- SLLLOOWW Down and check in during meetings
- Have an A format and B format for meetings. A format which is updating on areas B is panel on priority areas

Group 2 Discussion & Recommendations

- In-Person and zoom option subject to revision with bagley-keene act?
- Survey to determine optimal time: maybe move to 4 or 5PM, may allow for more meaningful participation
- Panel style presentations for new, controversial, or complex issues: don't do this in the same meetings as routine county updates due to time constraints
- Debate on whether to do thematic series or not
 - Pros: deeper diver & multiple perspectives
 - Cons: less efficiency & limited number of topics
- Key question: how many recommendations should we be making per year

Meeting Format Next Steps

• It was determined that Liz would work with Libby to come together with some recommendations for the next PHAB general meeting to engage with and decide on
