Scope & Objectives

- Investigate discrepancies in narratives related to COVID response and conditions in the jails
- Understand progress and identify root cause challenges related to the Mays Consent Decree Remedial Plan
- Make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors concerning the above to strengthen transparency surrounding these issues and improve allocation of resources toward high impact solutions aligned with public health principles

Letter to BOS (Oct/Nov 2021)

Background: High economic, social and health costs of incarceration. Racism as a public health threat & health equity lens. Second round of monitoring reports – inadequate care and need to reduce population.

Transparency & Accountability

- Public hearings on monitoring & consultant reports
- Dashboard with jail health metrics (Mays, staff vaccination, etc.)

PSJA

- Deputy CEO public health orientation; non law enforcement background
- Active engagement with PH, MH, trauma informed care expertise; CRC; individuals impacted by incarceration

In-Custody Death

- Immediate public reporting
- Analysis and mitigation
- Routine reporting of investigation results, corrective actions

Second Letter

- ➤ Premise: Reduce jail population & connect justice-involved individuals to needed services
 - ➤ In line with public health best practice (APHA)
 - ➤ In line with Supreme Court In re Humphreys
 - County is committed to reducing jail pop via Mays Consent Decree
- ➤ **Objective**: Provide recommendations to BOS to make investments in programs that reduce jail population & recidivism, and connect justice-involved individuals to the services they need
- **≻** Recommendations
 - 1. Expand Capacity for Pre-Trial Diversion to Improve Public Health Outcomes, Reduce the Jail Population, and Reduce Recidivism
 - 2. Restore and Expand Capacity for Mental Health Treatment in the General Community through Investments in SCMHTC and EMPOWER
 - 3. Expand Supportive Housing to Improve Service Connections, Reduce Recidivism, Reduce Costs Associated with Incarceration, and Promote Public Safety
