The Sacramento County Health Center is a HRSA Federally Qualified Health Center that provides primary care and behavioral health services to low-income residents of Sacramento County.

In our Broadway location which is ideally located to serve our patient population, we are co-located with WIC, Chest Clinic, Sexual Health Clinic, County Pharmacy, Sacramento Covered, and Quest Diagnostic Lab.

Nearly all (99%) of providers are from University of California, Davis, either faculty or residents. We have strong partnerships with School of Medicine, School of Nursing, Department of Community & Family Medicine, Department of Pediatrics, and Department of Psychiatry. We recently enter an agreement working with a Kaiser Fellow which may open future opportunities.
