Landfills are the third largest source of methane in California.

Californians send 2.5 billion meals worth of still-fresh, unsold food to landfills each year.

1 in 5 Californians does not have enough to eat.



California State Mandate



Regulation Effective
January 1, 2022



Jurisdictions are Required to
Implement Local Edible Food
Recovery Programs

- Reduce organic waste destined for landfills by 75%
- Increase Food Recovered by 20%

- Gap analysis, expand capacity if current capacity is insufficient
- Provide education and outreach to food generators
- Increase generator access to food recovery organizations (FRO)
- Monitor compliance and conduct enforcement

Tier 1

January 1, 2022

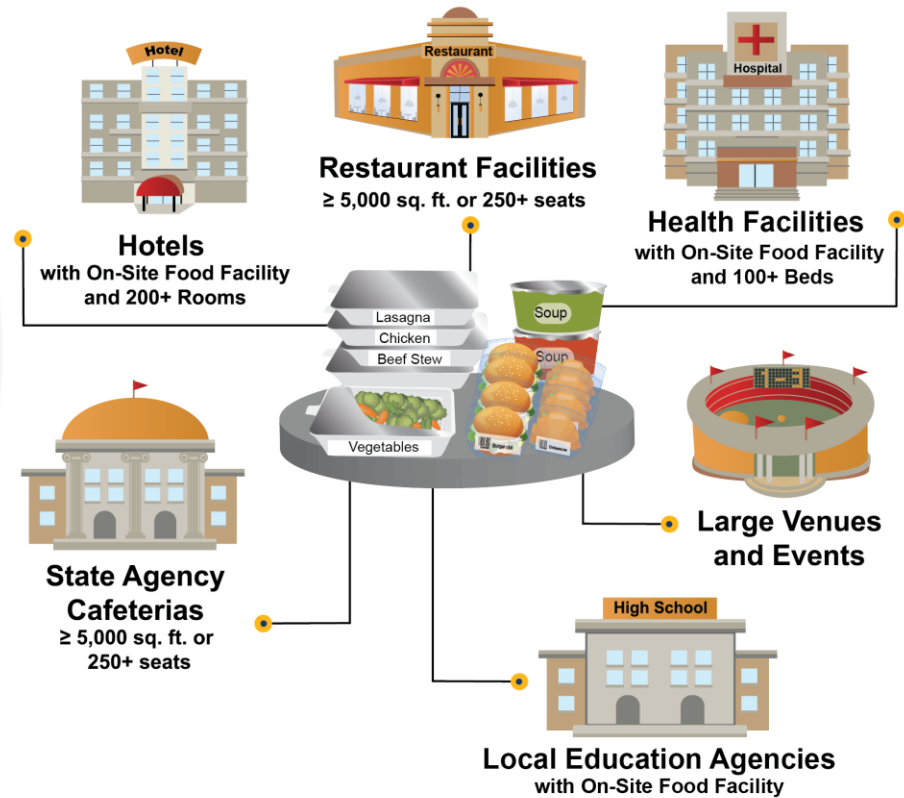
Tier one businesses typically have more produce, fresh grocery, and shelf-stable foods to donate.



Tier 2

January 1, 2024

Tier two businesses typically have more prepared foods to donate, which often require more careful handling to meet food safety requirements (e.g. time and temperature controls).

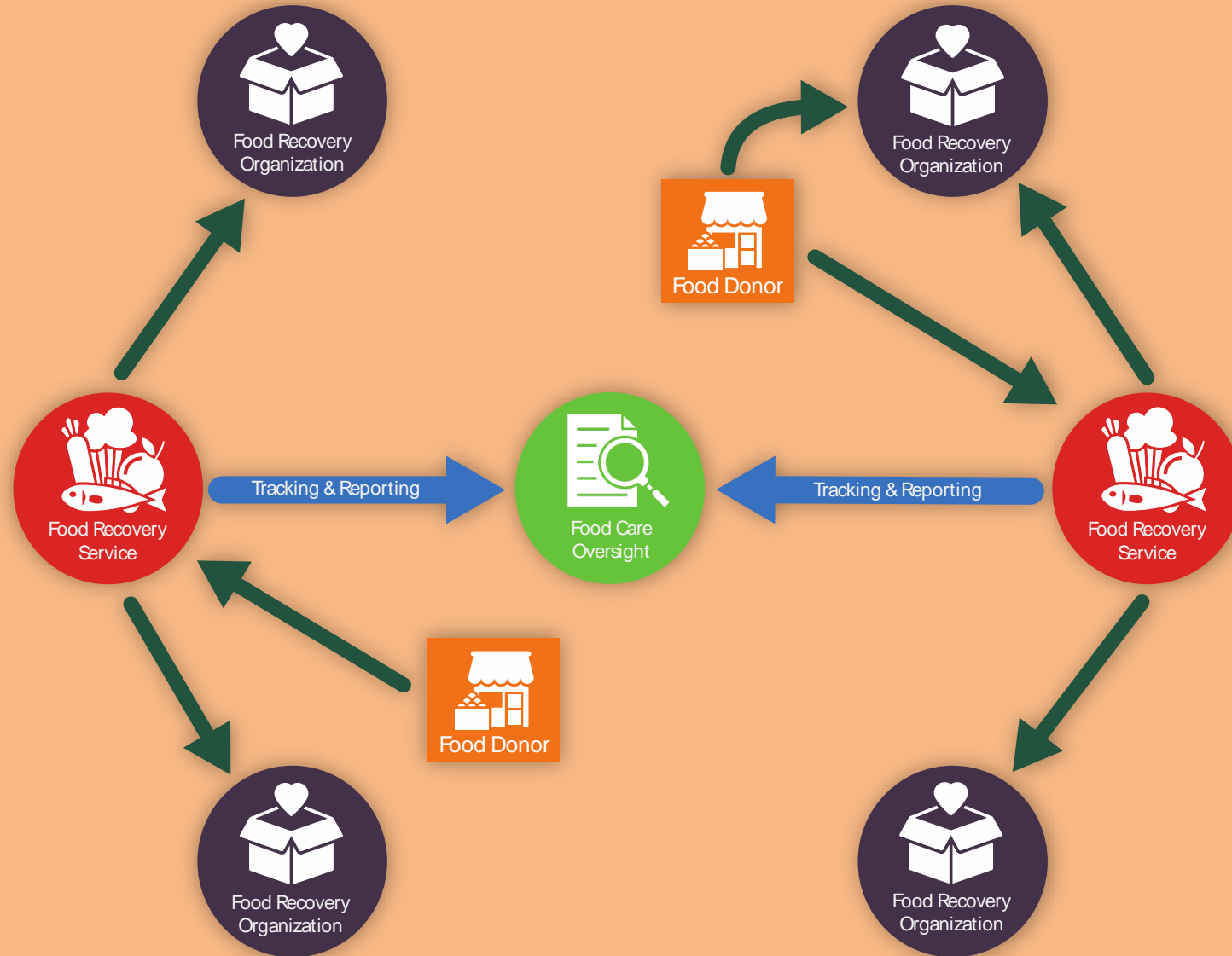

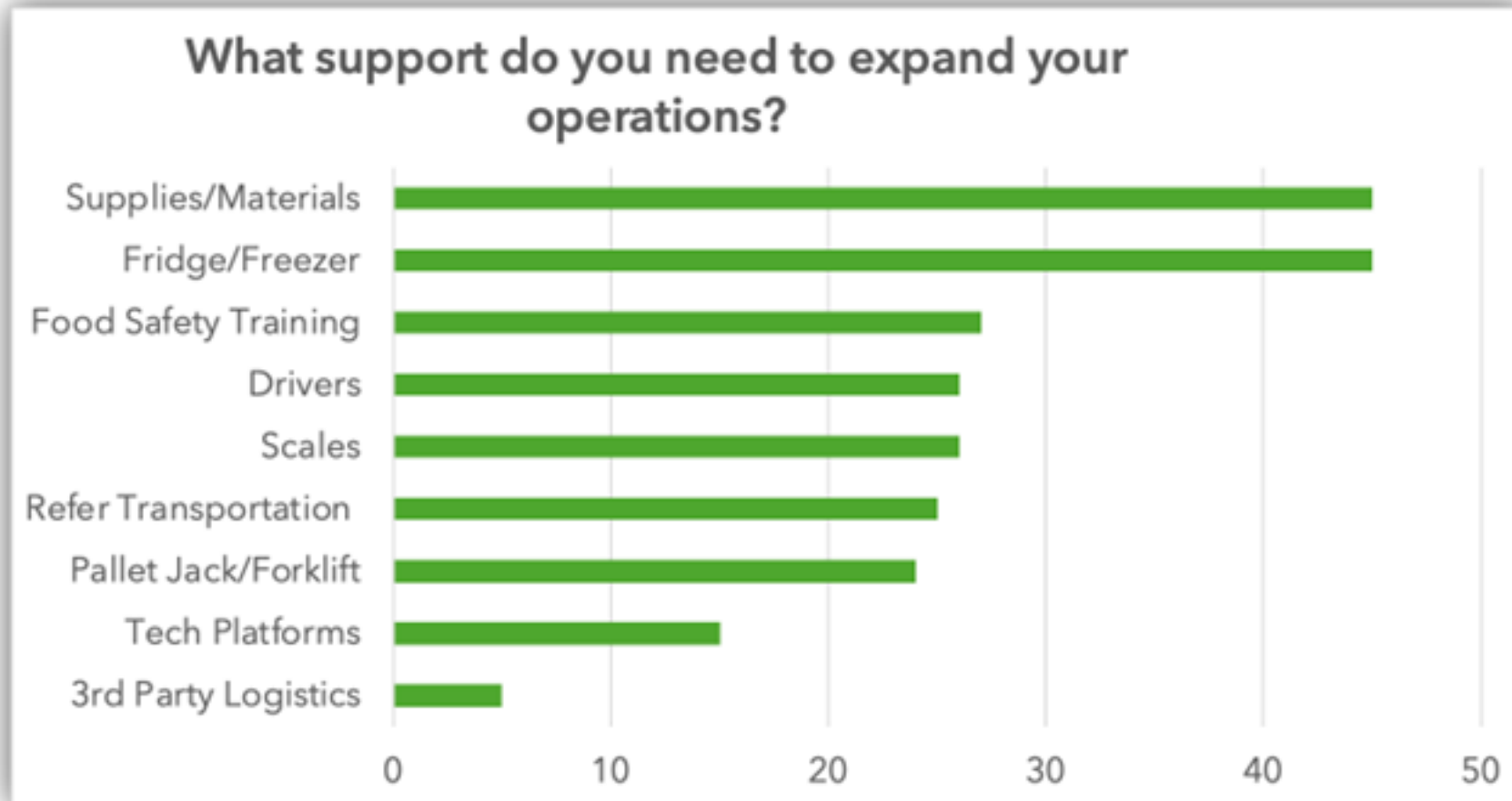

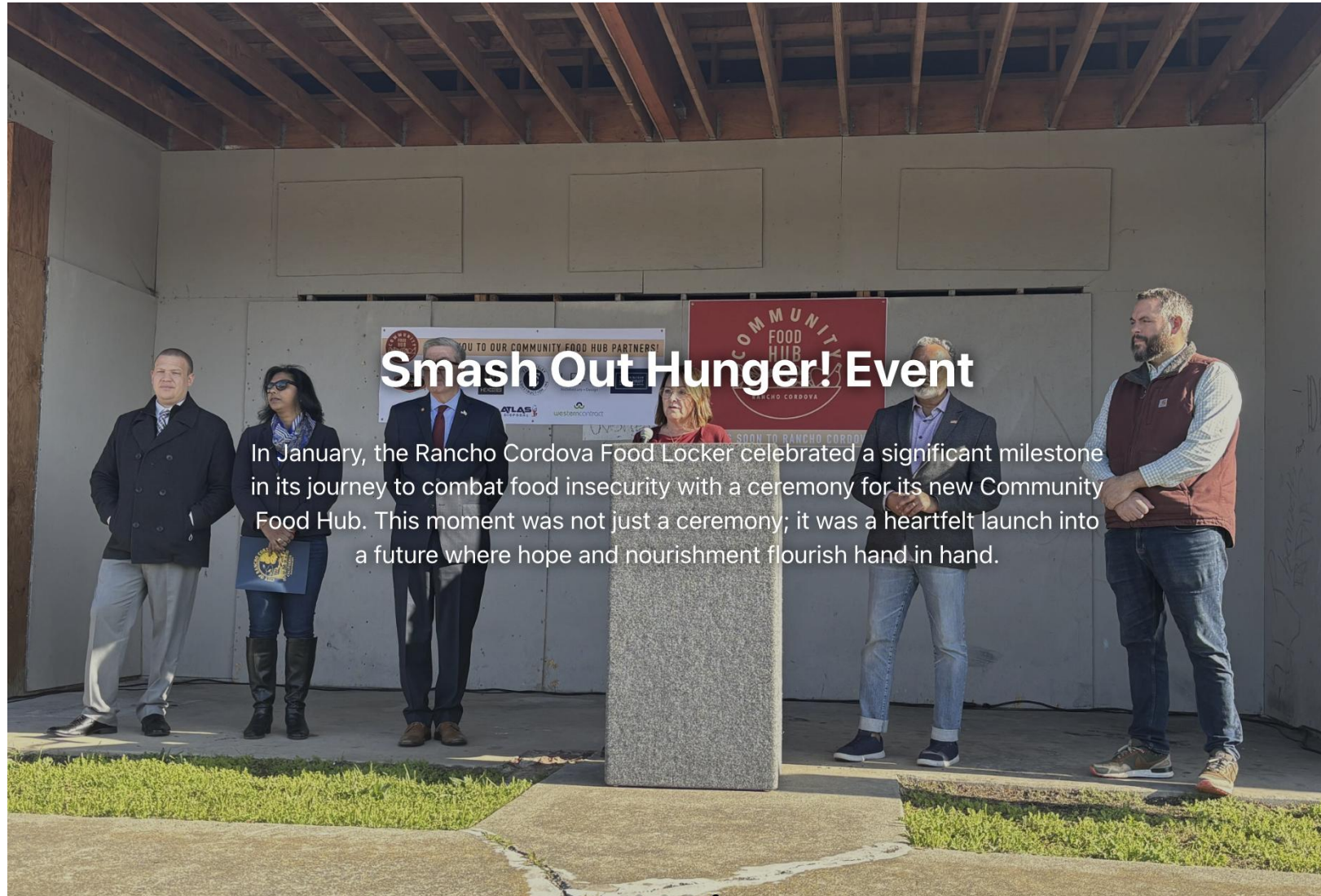
