Crisis Continuum

- Front Door Avoiding Psychiatric Hospitalizations
- Inpatient
- Back Door Appropriate setting for discharge

Front Door – Avoiding Psychiatric Hospitalization

- Mobile Crisis Support Teams
- Crisis Residential 4 sites
- Urgent Care Expanding to 24/7
- Triage Peer Navigators
- Community Support Team

Inpatient

- Current: 433 psychiatric hospital beds
 - Two 16 bed Psychiatric Health Facilities (PHFs)
- Coming Soon: 133 additional beds
 - Sacramento Behavior Healthcare Hospital
 - HOPE Center 16 bed PHF



Inpatient (Continued)

- Crisis Now: SAMHSA Sponsored / Endorsed Best Practices
 - With a population of 1.6 M residents, need 225 psychiatric hospital beds

Back Door – Appropriate Setting for Discharge

- Subacute
 - Mental Health Rehabilitation Centers (MHRCs)
- Other New Investments: ~\$5 M
- Adult Residential Treatment
- Augmented Board and Care
- Intensive Placement Teams

CA State Budget

- \$2.2 B in competitive grants to construct, acquire, and rehabilitate real estate assets to expand the community continuum of behavioral health treatment resources
- BH Continuum Assessment
