CHANGE TO 7TH GRADE VARICELLA REQUIREMENT

As of July 1, 2025, there is no longer a requirement to verify two doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine for students advancing to 7th grade. This change reflects the fact that most students will have already met the requirement in previous years as part of the existing immunization requirements for school entry.

However, the two dose varicella requirement will continue to apply to students who are newly admitted to any grade level, including 7th grade.

Typically, a new <u>admission</u> refers to new students enrolling in a CA school or new school district for the first time and not simply promoting from one grade to the next within the same school district.

Schools will no longer be required to check for varicella immunizations at the time of 7th grade advancement after June 30, 2025. Immunization records should still be reviewed for all new admissions, regardless of grade level, to ensure compliance with all vaccine requirements. PERINATAL HEPATITIS B

Hepatitis B is a virus that is spread through contact with infected blood and body fluids, including perinatal transmission. This can cause both acute and chronic liver disease. Chronic (long-term) infection is a major risk factor for developing liver cancer and chronic health issues, according to the American Cancer Society and the National Institutes of Health (NIH).

An effective vaccine is available to protect against this virus.

Sacramento County has a Perinatal Hepatitis B Prevention Program (PHBP) for infants born to mothers who are carriers of hepatitis B. This program coordinates the testing and immunizations of susceptible family members and household contacts and assists families to stop the spread of perinatal hepatitis B.

THE CALIFORNIA IMMUNIZATION REGISTRY (CAIR2)

The California Immunization Registry (CAIR2) is a confidential and secure statewide system used to record and track immunizations. Assembly Bill (AB) 1797 requires healthcare organizations to enroll in CAIR2 and record all immunizations administered. The law also mandates that race and ethnicity must be recorded in CAIR2 when entering the administered vaccinations. Providers are required to document vaccine administration in the medical record system within 24 hours of administration and report doses administered to CAIR2 within 72 hours.

VACCINE STORAGE COMPETENCE

To maintain vaccine effectiveness, all vaccines must be stored within the temperature ranges recommended by the manufacturer. The California Department of Public Health provides detailed guidance and job aids on the EZIZ website covering best practices for vaccine storage units, digital data loggers, and temperature monitoring.

MEASLES

BACK-TO-SCHOOL VACCINATION AND CANCER PREVENTION ACT IMPLEMENTATION IN CALIFORNIA

The most recent 2025-2026 school update from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and Shots for School highlights information about <u>back-to-school vaccinations and the Cancer Prevention Act in California.</u>

The <u>Cancer Prevention Act, Assembly Bill No. 659</u>, was effective January 1, 2024. This requires schools to notify 6th grade parents or legal guardians about recommendations for human papillomavirus vaccine (HPV). HPV is not required by California law. However, it is important to strongly recommend HPV vaccine to prevent cancers that can be caused by HPV.

is an official electronic immunization record generated from the California Immunization Registry (CAIR2).

IMMUNIZATION REPORTING

Annual immunization assessment reporting for the 2025-2026 school year will open September 1st. The deadline is December 5th, 2025. Early reporting is encouraged. Reports can be revised until the deadline date. California Health and Safety Code Section 120375 and California Code of Regulations Section 6075 require all child care facilities and schools (including home schools) to review student immunization records and report annually on the immunization status of their students attending Pre-kindergarten/Child Care (ages 2-5 years), TK/K, or 7th grade. Schools will continue to report using <u>CAIR Hub</u> again this year. New users need to register for a CAIR Hub account (SCRL users already have one).
